For safety's sake, clearer road name is needed

There's one simple solution to the numbers-soup mess that's always confused motorists along the state routes connecting central Licking County to Columbus.

The entire Ohio 161/37/16 corridor from New Albany to Cherry Valley Road at the Granville-Newark border needs one dominant identifier once the expressway construction project wraps up in early 2010.

Motorists often incorrectly state what stretch of road they're driving on when they call 911 to report a crash or emergency. That was certainly the case dur-

ing a major crash May 30 when responders were sent to Ohio 161 west of Alexandria rather than Ohio 37 west of Granville. One man later died, although it's unknown if response times played a role.

Such delays are not acceptable in our modern world where cell-phone calls can help authorities respond with amazing speed.

We commend the Granville Fire Department for addressing this issue by developing a new response plan for the corridor and asking ODOT to erect more visible signs to alert motorists to

the changing route numbers, something the state appears willing to do. Chief Jeff Hussey also suggested placing mile markers often seen on limited-access highways.

Those are good ideas, but perhaps it would be best if the entire route was re-named I-670 as a logical extension of the Columbus interstate from downtown to Interstate 270 near Port Columbus International Airport. Or perhaps the 161 name should be extended all of the way to Newark, instead of terminating near Alexandria. Even a ceremonial name might prove better.

The bad news here is such name changes are decided by ODOT, which must adhere to federal rules for such matters. What might seem simple and obvious to most of us could get snared in bureaucracy.

A new name not only would improve safety, but also allow all of us to give easier to understand directions rather than telling visitors to ignore the signs and drive straight until you reach Newark.

Let's not spend more than \$100 million on a new expressway and ignore a real safety and convenience issue.
